Elephant decides to walkabout Big Sky Country

April 17 (UPI) — An elephant escaped from a traveling circus in Montana and went wandering through traffic in Butte.



Silver Bow County Chief Executive J.P. Gallagher said the female elephant, named Viola, escaped from the Jordan World Circus on Tuesday and went walking down the middle of Harrison Avenue amid heavy traffic.

Sheriff Ed Lester explained that Viola had fled the circus when she was spooked by a passing vehicle.

Shocked residents captured photos and videos of Viola's time on the loose.

"My coworker pointed out, 'There's an elephant!' Started jumping up and down, pointing out the window," Civic Center Town Pump co-manager Josh Hannifin told NBC Montana. "We ran out the door and finally caught a video of the elephant coming through the lot here. Pretty exciting."

Gallagher told CBS News that the runaway elephant caused minor damage to a storage area at the Civic Center, but "we are grateful that everyone remained unharmed."

The pachyderm pursuit ended with Viola being caught by her handlers and safely returned to the circus.

Animal rights groups PETA and PAWS reported in separate statements that Viola had escaped from the circus before in 2010 and 2014.

"She's not just a teacher," said one of her students, Addison, in a video tribute. "She is like a friend."

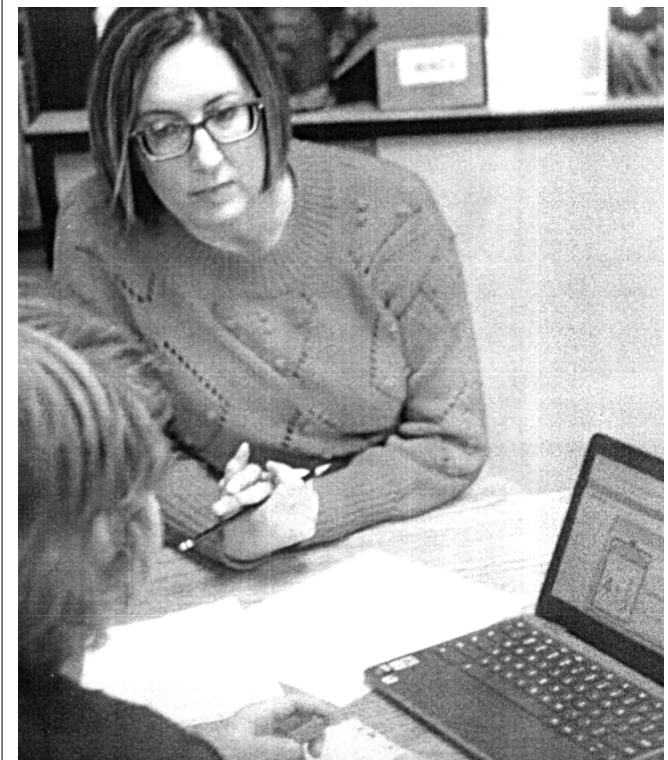
Her teaching technique

Linden woman, granddaughter die in Modesto accident

A head-on collision that triggered a multi-vehicle accident on McHenry Avenue in Modesto killed four people including a Turlock infant and her grandmother from Linden, the California Highway Patrol reported.

The collision happened at 4:01 p.m. Tuesday on McHenry Avenue, north of Hogue Road and near Del Rio, east of the Del Rio Country Club.

A 2004 Mitsubishi, driven by a 19-year-old Angeles Lisset Escoto of Merced, was traveling northbound on McHenry

Avenue in the number one lane. For an unknown reason she allowed the Mitsubishi sedan to enter the number two lane and then veered back into the number one northbound lane and then veered into the number one lane of the southbound traffic, the CHP reported.

The driver of the 2019 Toyota, Patricia Marie Lopez, 60, of Linden was transported by ground ambulance to Memorial Medical Center where she later succumbed to her injuries, Olsen said. A 1-year-old Turlock

baby was in the Toyota and was taken by ambulance to Doctors Medical Center. She died of her injuries at the hospital, the CHP reported. She was identified as Clara Howells.

"I went out in front and my gosh, it was disastrous, heart-wrenching," said Barney Aggers, who

lives near the crash. "It looked like a NASCAR crash."

"The best way to describe this is it was instant and intense," said Officer Tom Olsen with California Highway Patrol Modesto. "Most of us are parents, not just first responders. I can tell you (Back page—Accident)

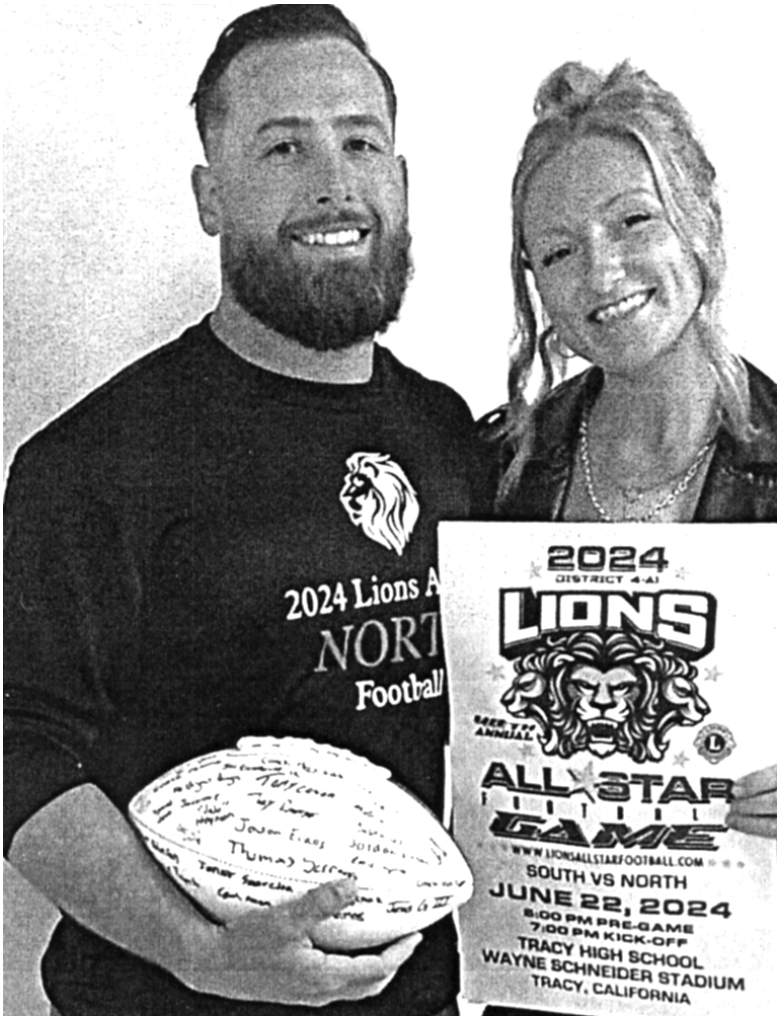

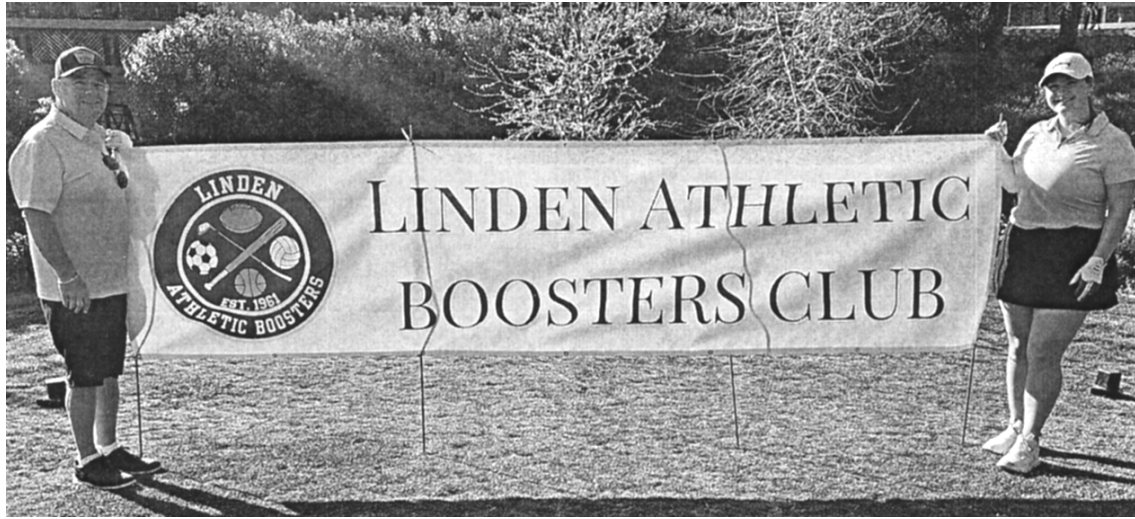

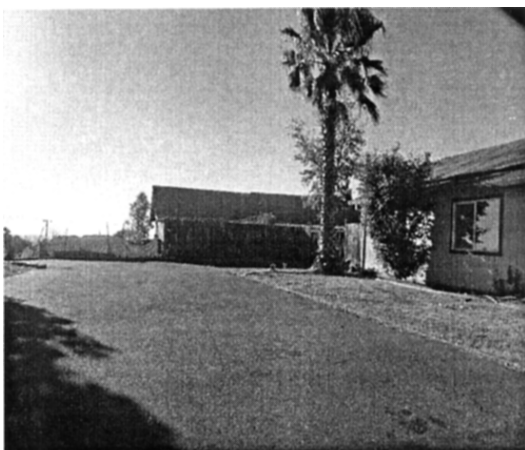

Her husband Archie died 1988. They had two daughters and both live on the ranch in Milton. One daughter,

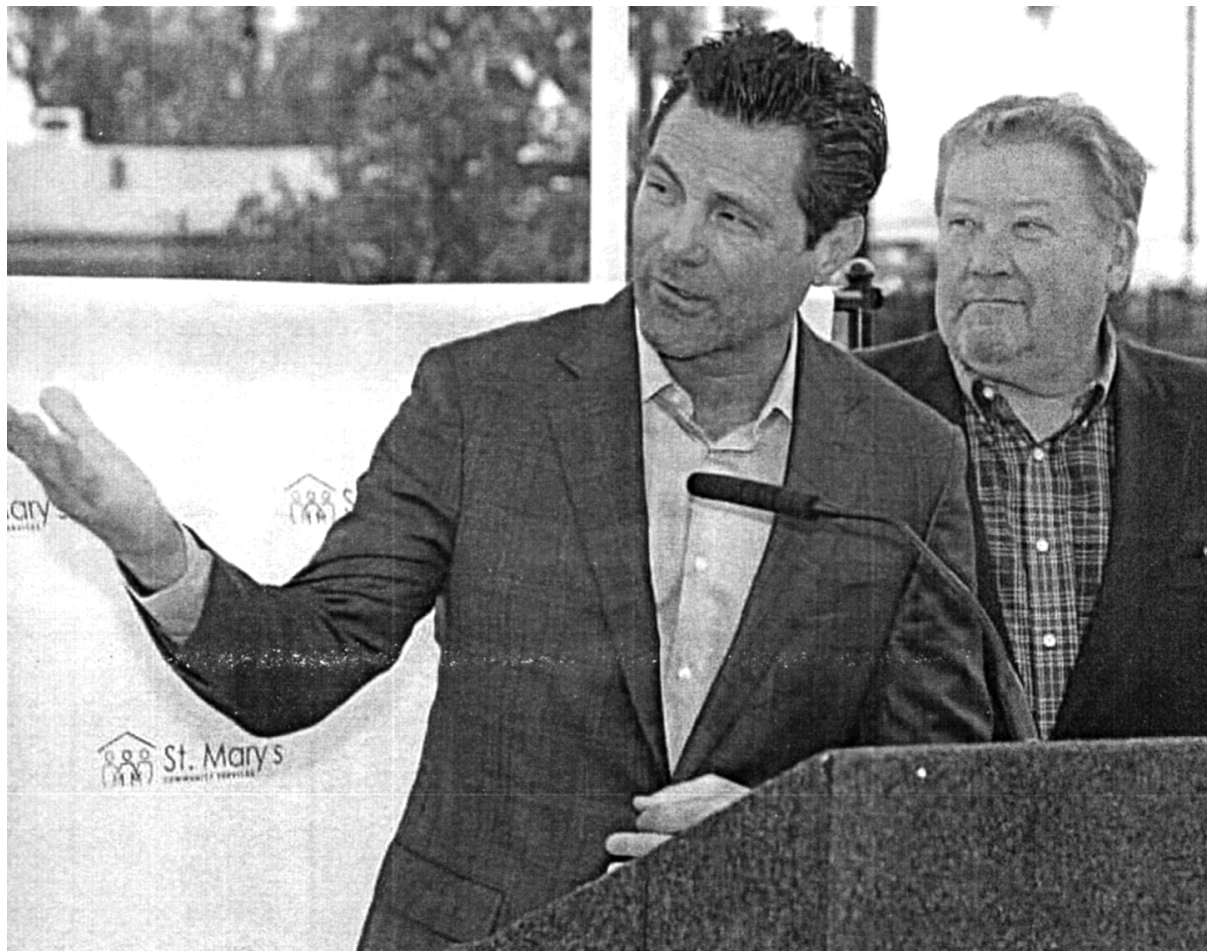
Mary Ann, lives in the home with Clare and another daughter, Anita lives very close.

Clare loves to share all her photo books and past history with visitors.

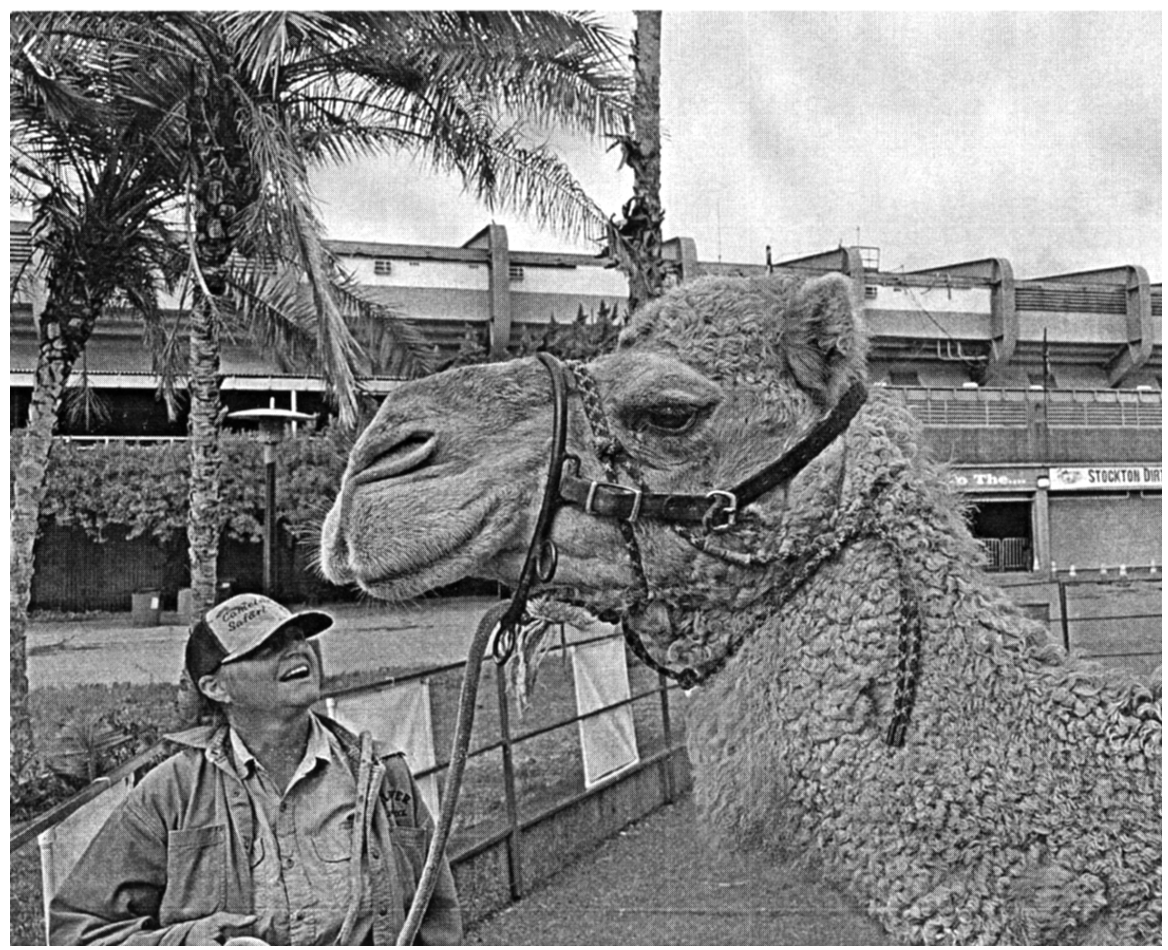

California fishermen have spoken out against state water management policies after federal fishing officials canceled ocean salmon fishing season in the state for the second consecutive year, delivering a major blow to the fishing industry.

In a unanimous vote Wednesday, the Pacific Fishery Management Council - which is responsible for managing fisheries in federal waters along the West Coast - recommended closing all California commercial and recreational ocean salmon fisheries



through the end of the year. Similar to last year's recommendation, the council said this year's closure will help conservation goals for salmon stocks.

April 15 (UPI) — A repair project at a Michigan home led to a surprising discovery: a time capsule of items dating back more than 100 years.

Jesse Leitch said he hired a crew for repair work after the heater failed at his Grand Rap-



ids home and the workers had to cut through the bathroom ceiling, where they found the stash of items.

"Just basically as they were cutting into the ceiling above the bathroom — it wasn't in a box, it was just all this stuff kind of set in a pile basically," Leitch told WZZM-TV.

The 12 items found inside the ceiling included a handwritten note with a drawing, a tiny cast iron pan, a small percussion instrument, a marble, a couple of dominoes, a picture of Jesus and newspaper clippings from 1915.

"I knew this place was built in 1910. And so it's just a really old building and made me think about, you know, obviously, some kid living here thought this stuff was important to stick around for the next guy," Leitch said.

Demolition crews tearing down the Richmond Mall in Forest Acres, S.C., found a time capsule of their own last month.

Officials said the capsule, buried when the mall opened in 2000, will be reburied in a park set to replace the mall until its scheduled opening in 2033.

Sneaky hippo escapes and wanders around

April 15 (UPI) — Residents in a suburb of Cape Town, South Africa, had a brush with the wild when a hippopotamus escaped from a nature reserve and wandered through the streets.

Grassy Park residents cap-



tured photos and videos when the hippo broke through a fence at the Rondevlei Nature Reserve and went wandering through residential streets just after midnight Saturday. Resident Ashraff Schwartz said police pursued the hippo into the yard of his family's home.

"My 74-year-old mom watched from inside the house, very scared, as the hippo came straight for our door. The police were standing outside the yard," he told

without hesitation that the first responders there did everything they could to save that child's life."

"We usually give a traffic safety message regarding these incidents. If you don't do this already, go home, hug your kid and tell them you love them," Olsen said.

Olsen said that there were also several good Samaritans who jumped into action to try and save the victims. CBS13 spoke with one of them over the phone who said he was holding Lopez's hand down to what he believed was her final breath. He said she was saying her husband's name and his thoughts and prayers go out to her daughter.

"You see the impacts of this stuff and my heart goes out to the family of that grandmother and the little baby," Aggers said.

The heartbreak of this tragedy was magnified when it was shared that Lopez's daughter and the mother of Clara, Amanda Howell, works as an emergency room nurse at Memorial Medical Center in Modesto.

"As an emergency department staff member one of our greatest fears is that our family would be brought in as a trauma or medical emergency," wrote Ashley Miguel, a friend who organized a GoFundMe account.

"While at work on Tuesday 4/9/24 one of our coworkers/friend experienced such a tragedy. Amanda's mother was brought in as a trauma from a motor vehicle accident while her one year-old daughter who was also in the vehicle was taken to Doctors Medical Center, our other local trauma hospital. Both of them tragically lost their lives.

"Losing your mother/best friend unexpectedly is unimaginable but the loss of a child is a pain I can't fathom. Our hearts are incredibly

La Rossa said her niece has been a nurse for six years, with all of her work in Memorial's emergency department.

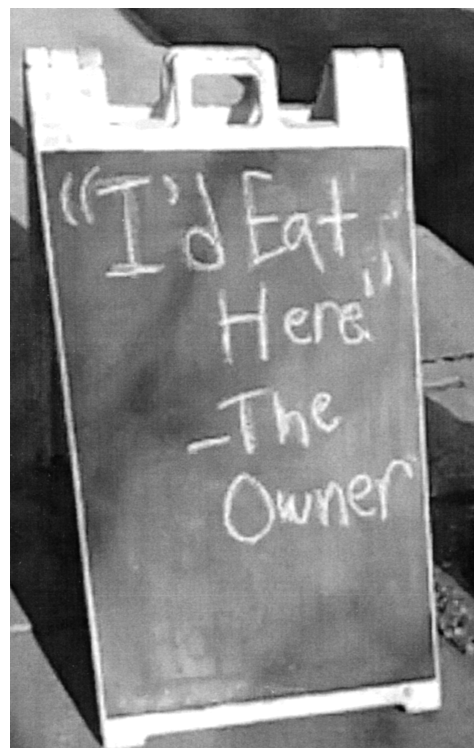
